



Our Young Volunteers

Interview by Mrs. Apoorva Shetty

- Mrs. Apoorva Shetty, post graduate in Psychology, has completed her post graduate diploma in personality development under Dr. Tushar Guha. Today she is a part of the faculty team of Nrityanjali and conducts workshops and counselling. She is equally involved into other social activities of Nrityanjali organised for old homes, orphanages and jail inamtes. She shares with us an interview she conducted of the young volunteers who offered their time by volunteering at Nrityanjali Fest - Inter School competitions. Nrityanjali Fest has completed 33 years and is an initiative of Nrityanjali to promote



creativity, nurture talent and build confidence among children. This event is held across Mumbai, Navi Mumbai and Thane district. The details of Nrityajnali Fest are shared in the news section.

My association with Nrityanjali goes way back to my college days when I did my Special Personality Development Course (SPDC I). Later I got introduced to the different sections that Nrityanjali works in, Nrityanjali Fest interschool competitions being one of them. *Nrityanjali Fest started in 1987.*

My volunteering journey goes back to more than a decade. Nrityanjali Fest gave me an exposure of how events take place - the planning, the execution, coordinating the different competitions, setting up the place etc. It also helped me improve my Interpersonal skills - handling people of different age groups, presence of mind and coming up with quick solutions during emergencies and always have a smile. It has been a cherishing experience all through.

This year we had youngsters who volunteered for Nrityanjali FEST this time. Some are college students while others are working professionals. Each of them have volunteered for the first time though all of them have been associated with Nrityanjali's activities over the years in some way or the other. They are either students of Kathak class, Sunday class or Music class, or Nrityanjali's Personality Development Courses. It was wonderful interviewing these young and bright volunteers. I feel nostalgic while sharing their experiences as it takes me back to the days when I was new. Here are their expressions

and I do hope to have many more young volunteers next year:

1. Did you have any knowledge about Nrityanjali FEST interschool competitions before you became a volunteer?

Ankita Narkar (AN) I didnt know about this aspect of Nrityanjali as Nrityanjali is very diverse and big. I was given a brief idea of the Fest but it was huge in numbers, much more than what I had expected.

Pooja Narayan (PN) I got to know about the Fest from my kathak class friends, who had volunteered before. They told me how to go about it and what will be expected.

Sakshi Patil (SP) Nrityanjali is multidimensional with multiple activities going on and I was only attached to Nrityanjali dance and music classes. My sister who was invited as a Judge informed me about Fest.

Sejal Ghadi (SG) I was given a rough idea about the Fest by Dr. Anonna Guha. She did not tell me much in detail but just asked me to experience it for myself.

Dinesh Singh (DS) I have been a NCC cadet previously and thus have been part of organizing events. So I had an idea. But Nrityanjali Fest was much bigger than what I had expected.

Sachi Prasad (SP) I did not know much about the Fest though I have been with Nrityanjali Kathak class since my school days.

Shashank Dey (SD) I had participated in the Nrityanjali Fest as a young boy and even won prizes. Thus, I knew what the Fest was all about.

2. How was your experience on the very first day of volunteering?

AN- I was a little scared and stressed when I realized that I had to handle such huge numbers. But as the day proceeded, I was able to handle them well.

- **PN-** I was excited as I love being with children. At times, I was a little confused as smaller children were difficult to handle. Yet things went on smoothly.
- **SP** Seniors gave us clear instructions on how to conduct the competitions. Thus, the events took place smoothly. I could handle all of my assigned classes quite well.
- **SG** The first day was quite overwhelming. I was bit tensed about how to handle the tasks. But my seniors and fellow volunteers guided me.
- **DS -** First day was difficult as it was my first time. I realised that the Fest is not only about the students but also their parents and teachers who accompany them. I had a tough time tackling difficult parents.
- **SP** My first day was at the Central Zone, Ghatkopar. It was a Saturday and thus the events were much less compared to the other days that I volunteered. And I was mainly in the back office, writing certificates, coordinating with the seniors etc
- **SD** As I had an idea of the Fest, the events took place as expected. Things went on very smoothly.
- 3. Can you share with us any Fun/ Interesting Moments, that you would remember always?
- **AN Cherished Moment** I had to handle a class of almost 60 Jr. Kg students with covolunteers. All the students didn't know their

full names. But they very sweetly tried to pronounce it and that was very nice.

- **PN Fun Moment** Girish Sir gave me the opportunity to announce the results on the microphone which was very exciting.
- **SP-** <u>Interesting Moment</u> I was handling the debate competition and as the debate was going on quite aggressively, I had to be alert.
- **SG-** Fun Moment I felt the entire experience of the Fest was very exciting in itself.
- **DS** <u>Fun Moment</u> My behaviour with all the judges was very formal and my obedience to the core was quite evident. That is when one of the judges asked me to relax and calm down. He held out the door for me rather than me doing it which made the entire situation quite funny, yet emotional.
- **SP Interesting / Fun Moment** I was given the task of receiving the judges. However, I couldn't recognize many and later realized that they had by themselves come to the judges room. Instead of welcoming them at the gate, I welcomed many after they had settled down.
- **SD-** <u>Fun Moment</u> During the debate competition, one boy got very aggressive with his stand that he suddenly stood up on the chair. All were pleasantly surprised by his sudden behaviour. It was quite unexpected.

4. How was your experience with the Seniors at Nrityanjali?

- **AN** It was a wonderful experience. All the seniors were very supportive. I learnt a lot of things including **event management**, how the duty sheets need to be made with a lot of precision, being **patient**, **calm and relaxed** to handle any situation.
- **PN** It was great. From the seniors I learnt how to be **spontaneous**, **quick and meticulous**. Also learnt the importance of Planning. Everything was so properly planned and arranged. **Time management** was also the key for effectiveness. The seniors were all

very **energetic**, quick on their toes. They were equally warm and gentle and extremely caring.

SP-The seniors were extremely helpful. I learnt how an entire event is planned and executed.

SG-The seniors were extremely patient and supported us even when we made mistakes. Anonna Maám briefed us about different competitions. She did scold us when we made mistakes but we knew there was a lot of care and concern behind those scolding. Girish Sir taught us that in any situation we need to remain calm so we could find solutions and always have a smile.

DS-I got to learn a lot from each Senior person. **Dr. Tushar Guha Sir**-Sir was very caring and hospitable towards each volunteer. He himself was serving us lunch and I learnt how a big person can be so simple and rooted. Dr. Anonna Guha Maám - She was extremely caring. In spite of how busy she was, she always ensured if each and every volunteer had eaten their lunch or snack. Girish Sir-He showed me how we could introduce judges in an interesting way so that even the younger participants find it interesting and at least remember the judge's name. Maitri Maám and Sangita Maám- I learnt how to handle the parents communicate with them and how to ensure if things are in place before any event starts.

SP - I learnt how to be spontaneous and being constantly on one's toes.

SD- I learnt from the Seniors how to manage the various events. Also learnt how we could be **better communicators** especially while communicating with students or parents.

5. Kindly share with us the lessons you learnt from your experience? Would you like to volunteer again for Nrityanjali FEST?

AN - I have gained Confidence and learnt Public Speaking

These skills will surely help me in the future and most certainly I would like to volunteer for Nrityanjali FEST again.

PN - This Fest journey taught me - Alertness, Time Management, Team Work and Interactive Skills.

As I would be pursuing my career in the travel and tourism industry, these skills will definitely help me excel professionally and I hope to be back in the Fest again.

SP - The learnings are:-

1. I have become more confident and motivated to now participate in my college's Student Council Events.

2. Developed Public Speaking Skills and now I'm not afraid to speak in front of a crowd. It will be good to be back with Fest again.

SG - Different skills have been developed and I would like to continue with Fest therefore.

Introduction to Special Personality Development Course Level - 1 (SPDC) How was the need (to attend spdc) identified?

I was part of a one-day programme conducted by Dr.Anonna Guha of Nrityanjali on personality development. The program was meant to give an overview on the importance of personality development especially in a corporate environment.

Their delivery methods are unique and highly effective. Each faculty member had his/her own style, yet reflected a commonness that can only be experienced. Hence the learnings have left an everlasting impression on all of us.

Utility of the SPDC learning and takeaway in corporate life

The SPDC programme has changed my life for good. It has been one of the best decisions that I have ever made. The people around me and my loved ones can see the changes in me.

The programme has greatly enhanced my professional life too. I am a sales professional so I am dealing with new people every day at various levels.

Because of the SPDC programme I am more confident now while dealing and interacting with people. Through the programme I am aware of the various personality types and why people do what they do, connecting with people and building a rapport with them is much easier now. I feel more confident under my skin so it has positively affected my performance. The good work that the faculty members have done on me is that, today I am able to positively influence people I meet, with ease.

I have got several compliments about the way I dress, walk, talk and also my etiquette, all thanks to the SPDC programme. I am able to lead my team better now and our

performance has substantially increased as a team. CAREER IN THE FIELD OF GEOGRAPHY

While a common question of those who are studying geography is, What are you going to do with a degree in geography, there are actually many options and potential careers for geography majors. Geography is a major that teaches students a wide-range of useful skills for the marketplace. Employers value the wide-ranging computer, research, and analytical skills that geography students bring to work as employees. While jobhunting, it's important to stress these skills you've gained during college.

While there aren't many job titles that are geographer, there are many types of positions that fit well with a degree in geography. Think about some of the options below as you begin your job search.

Be sure to intern in any area of interest to get your foot in the door and gain valuable on-the-job experience. Your resume will be much more impressive if you have real world experience in the areas you're applying for .

Urban Planner/Community Development

- Geography is a natural tie-in with urban or city planning. City planners work on zoning, land use, and new developments, from a gas station renovation to the development of whole new sections of urban area. You'll work with individual property owners, developers, and other officials. If you're interested in this area, be sure to take urban geography and urban planning classes. An internship with a city planning agency is essential experience for this type of work.

Cartographer - Those with cartography course backgrounds may enjoy work as a cartographer. The news media, book publishers, atlas publishers, government agencies and others are looking for cartographers to help produce maps. This would likely require relocation.

GIS Specialist - City governments, county agencies, and other government agencies and private groups are often in need of experienced GIS professionals. Coursework and internships in GIS are especially important. Computer programming or engineering skills are very helpful in this arena - the more about computers and languages you know, the better off you are.

Climatologist - Agencies like the National Weather Service, news media, the Weather Channel, and other government entities occasionally need climatologist. Admittedly, these jobs usually go to those with meteorology degrees, a geographer with experience and vast coursework in meteorology and climatology would definitely be an asset.

Transportation management - Like urban and city planning, there are opportunities in local government but regional transit authorities or shipping, logistics, and transportation companies look kindly to someone with transportation geography in their background and good computer and analytical skills.

Environmental Management - A plethora of environmental assessment, cleanup, and management companies exist throughout the world today. A geographer brings excellent skills for project management and the development of reports like environmental impact reports. It's often a wide-open field with tremendous growth opportunities.

Writer/Researcher - Undoubtedly during your college years you've spent time developing your writing skills and certainly as geography major you know how to research! How about a career as a writer - you could be a science writer or a travel writer for a magazine or newspaper. The About.com Freelance Writing site provides information to get started.

Emergency Management - Emergency management is an under-explored field for geographers. Geography majors make great emergency managers. They understand the interactions between humans and the

environment, know about hazards and earth processes, and can understand maps. Add in a bit of political acumen and leadership skills and you have a great emergency manager. Get started in this field by taking hazard courses in geography, geology, and sociology and intern with a local emergency management agency or the Red Cross.

Demographer - For the population geographer who loves demographic data, what can be more rewarding than becoming a demographer and working for state or federal agencies to help develop population estimates and present data? The U.S. Census Bureau is one of the few entities that actually has a position titled Geographer . Interning in a local planning agency will help in this area.

Marketing - Along a similar vein of demography, marketing is a good career for those interested in taking demographic information and getting the word out to those who match the demographics you're searching for. This is one of the more glamorous arenas a geographer can get involved in.

Librarian/Information Scientist - Your research skills as a geographer apply particularly well to work as a librarian. If you want to help people navigate the world of information, this is a potential career for you.

National Park Service Ranger - Are you a physical geographer who needs to be outside and couldn't even consider working in an office? Perhaps a career in the National Park Service is right up your alley?

Real Estate Appraisal - Real estate appraisers develop an opinion of value for a specific piece of property. The work involves research into appropriate market areas, the assemblage of pertinent data, and the use of various analytical techniques to provide an opinion that reflects all pertinent market evidence. This multidisciplinary field incorporates aspects from geography,

economics, finance, environmental planning, and law. A solid foundation in geography is essential to a real estate appraisers success and typical appraisal tools include aerial photos, topographic maps, GIS, and GPS.

Importance of Geography:

Geography studies the earth in relation to mankind. Man's life is mostly shaped by the environment in which he lives and Geography studies the relation between the earth and man.

According to Macnee, Geography is the study of earth as the home or in other words, Geography is the study of environment of man, physical and social, particularly with relation to human activities. Geography has been derived from the words, geo and graphy. Geo means earth and graphy means study or description.

So, Geography means description of earth. Geography studies all the three aspects of earth, viz. lithosphere, hydrosphere and atmosphere. Geography is related to other social sciences and we can study them better with a background of Geography. Geography is related to economic progress. Geographical factors influence agriculture, industry, trade, commerce and other aspects of economic development. Knowledge of Geography is essential for business, trade, commerce, agriculture, industry, navigation, military operation, and spacecraft and even for balancing and administration.

Thus, Geography influences the economic, social and cultural life of a nation. Knowledge of Geography is essential for successful living. Because of its practicable intellectual, cultural and economic value, Geography has assumed a unique place in the school curriculum.

Objectives of Teaching Geography:

(1) To acquaint the pupils with the living conditions of humans in different parts of the globe.

Young Entrepreneur

Introducing a New Column - Young Entrepreneurs - in this 29th year of PMP - Volume 29, No.1 Issue

Mrs. Falak Trivedi (F.T.) - a Wealth Consultant and a senior member of Nrityanjali Group chats with Mr. Birju Bhojani - a Young Entrepreneur

It's a November evening, and after much juggling about with the dates, here I am at the Nrityanjali office, eagerly, anxiously awaiting the arrival of our interviewee. A young entrepreneur, partner at B.N.V. Agroirrigation Co., Mr. Birju Bhojani (B.B.).

Amidst the usual busy evenings of the Nrityanjali office, as our youth from the performing arts wind up their rehearsals, Mr. Bhojani makes his way through the hustle into the office. A young gentleman with pleasant mannerisms and crisp, no fuss dressing, his humility almost seems palpable. As he settles in the chair he immediately quips, "Why is this needed?" "It is because inspirational stories of businesses, business owners need to be told. That is what helps our youth dream, hope and set goals. So shall we begin?", I ask. "Go ahead,"he says.

F.T.: So tell me something about the business?

B.B.: B.N.V. Agroirrigation Co. was started way back in 1988. This business is about making textiles that go into agriculture. They are broadly classified as agricultural textiles. Currently we have 2 units one is in Navi Mumbai, Mahape and the second is in Bhiwandi.

F.T.: So what is the nature of the textiles? **B.B.**: They are basically used for covering of the crops. You must have seen the green nets, they are known as shade nets. So what happens is that there is a lot of heat and sunlight in our country. Our crops need certain amount of light for proper growth. It's like creating a household for the crops. Specially



vegetable crops and nursery plants. It creates the environment for plants.

F.T.: How did you end up in the family business?

B.B.: So basically my father started with this in 1988 and set up a unit at New Bombay. I completed my production engineering after which I did a 6 month stint at Mazgaon docks. Immediately after that I joined my father's business and we were just used to making the shade nets. But there are other fabrics as well that go into agriculture.

F.T.: Tell me more about the products.

B.B.: Shade nets are used to cover the top but there are other nets also for the side to prevent pest attacks. Those are basically like the insect nets, the one's we use at our home, but for plants. So these are used for the protection of the plant. They are mostly used for vegetable seeds which have to have protection from the sides. It's a physical barrier that will prevent pest, virus attacks, insects like white flies, etc.

So this is the second line of business, the third is a little more exciting. We are distributors for an Austrian company for fabrics that go into canopy making. The kinds you see at the airports.

F.T. What does your client profile look like? **B.B.**: It's varied. It started with farmers, then nurseries and subsequently seed companies. The world's biggest seed company, Monsanto (now taken over by Bayer crop), they're one of our major clients. They have to use these nets for the vegetable seeds like capsicum, melon, etc.

F.T. Was it a natural choice to get into the family business or the interest developed subsequently?

B.B.:Actually I never wanted to be in this business. I'm an accidental businessman. I always wanted to be in the corporate world. But in hindsight I'm happy I came into this business by default because I feel that I'm manufacturing real products, a solution for someone and it makes a difference to someones life. It's very gratifying. I would've made the same amount of money even in the corporate but creating something is much for fun so that way I'm thankful for this business. As a small scale entrepreneur it is difficult to get quality people who have the same kind of passion.

F.T.: Did you have the judgment or stigma associated with family business that it came to you too easy? Usually friends or relatives think that.

B.B..: I never had that actually because it was never a great business to begin with. Now were doing well but it's a small scale enterprise. We do have some good projects lined up as I mentioned, we have diversified a bit. One of the streams is architectural fabrics as I mentioned and were doing pretty good in that. I have a platform and a foundation I want build upon now.

F.T.: What is the value add that you brought to the table, once you joined the business? Your style of functioning must be different from your father's.

B.B.: My father always worked on instincts, but I feel being an engineer I analyze things more, I'm a little more organized. A little more disciplined.

F.T.: How does the external environment, the economic policies affect your business. What is the business trend dependent upon?

B.B.: It is a seasonal business, as each of the products has their own season. For example we have a product called anti hail nets, if you've ever been to Shimla after Diwali you'll see them. Himachal is the second

largest state producing apples, first is Kashmir. When they grow apples in the cold climate, hilly regions, there is a chance of hailstorm which destroys the crop as well as the leaf cover. If the cover is destroyed, not only the crop this year but also for the subsequent couple of years will suffer. So anti hail nets are very important.

F.T.: So there's also this satisfaction of contributing to the bigger picture being in this business.

B.B.:That's true, Had I been in the corporate world Id be making some reports, making someones life easier maybe in reading some data. But here the products Im making, it's actually making a difference and Im happy about that.

F.T.: Did you gradually get passionate about the business, or once in a while its a battle with bottom-line, cost cutting and monetary gains become the priority?

B.B.: So money is definitely important and one needs to make a certain amount of money to live a certain lifestyle. But money is such a funny thing, that you'll not make money if you set out to make money. To make real money you need to be really good with your work. For instance, if I need to get orders from my customers, I can sell my nets by requesting them to buy and say its a good product which we term as push marketing. Or you can make the product so fantastic at such a great price that the customers seek you out. I've learnt this the hard way.

F.T.: In a business when your own money is invested, there sometimes is a dilemma that should you concentrate on quality or maybe cut corners to rake in a little more margin. How do you deal with this?

B.B.: I have actually learnt this from my father, and also from a customer s feedback. As I told you that we have a small scale enterprise. But we are still competing against some of the giants in our sector, which are thousand times bigger than us. Our competitors are listed on the Bombay stock exchange. One of our

competitors is a 5000cr company, and our products are compared with them. So there's a feeling of victory somewhere and it has been possible because we never cut corners. That's how a brand value is built. Either you build brand by advertising a lot or having an active sales force of 40 to 50 people. But I have a sales team of hardly 2 people so I cannot compete with them. So my game is to make a product so good and at such a rate that the customer will feel the difference. That's how I'm surviving in the market for the last 15-20 years.

F.T.: What would you say is your expansion plan?

B.B.: I believe, in life, that every 5 years a person has to change, has to reinvent because you are growing, your experiences are constantly changing. Had you called me for this interview 5 years ago, I would've probably been hesitant but Ive read somewhere, that never say no.

FT.: So it s a family business you father , you and your brother all three are a part of it. So does it ever happen that professional disagreements arise and there are tensions? How do you deal with it?


B.B.: All the time. But we have an unwritten law never discuss business matters at home and never discuss personal life at work. So

it's like Mahabharata that you fight from morning till evening but as the sun goes down, you lay your weapons. It also makes it easier since we have clearly demarcated areas in the business.

F.T.: What would be your advice to the younger generation or the students who are at the brink of their careers, choosing between entrepreneurship and a corporate job? Because in today's times, we are spoilt for choice and there are multiple opportunities. As good as it may be it is also mighty confusing. **B.B.**: Follow your passion! That's my advice. Even for my child I have that stance; I don't give priority to marks and academics as much. Even if you earn lesser than your corporate friends, maybe have a smaller car or something, you'll be happier. Job satisfaction is much more important in the long run. It's not true anymore that only if you make a certain amount of money or you're in a certain profession you're considered successful. I believe India is also changing and one of the advantages of the rapid changes is that people's mindsets have also changed.

F.T.: What s your take on work life balance? **B.B.**: The best way to put it is that when a sportsman prepares for his training, rest is as much a part of his training as working out. You need to take the time out to recharge your

batteries especially in my case. I need to come up with ideas. If my mind is not relaxed, that is not possible. You have to learn how to switch off and also have some physical activity, may be get in to some kind of sport.

Recipes French Delight CHICKEN STUFFED WITH GARLIC BUTTER

Ingredients:

500 gm chicken (minced), 120 gm butter

4 tbsp flour for coating,

2 cups breadcrumbs oil for frying

Salt and pepper to taste.

4 tbsp freshly snipped chives, 2 eggs (beaten)

Method:

- 1. Cook minced chicken.
- 2. Add salt and pepper. Mix well.
- 3. Make cutlets and keep aside.
- 4. Divide butter into 4 equal parts and shape into small sausages.
- 5. Chill until firm, sprinkle chopped chives.
- 6. Place 1 butter sausage in the centre of each chicken cutlet. Fold over the butter.
- 7. Dip the cutlets first in the flour then in beaten eggs and finally in bread crumbs.
- Chill thoroughly for at least 2 hours or overnight.
- Heat oil in a frying pan and fry chicken on both the sides until it is brown.
- Drain on absorbent paper and serve immediately.
- Heat olive oil in large pan, sauté onion, ginger and garlic till onions are translucent.
- Add cumin, paprika, pepper, bay leaves and carrots and cook for some time on a low flame.
- Now add tomatoes, boiled beans and vegetable stock.
- 4. Boil and let it simmer till carrots are tender.
- 5. Squeeze lemon juice before serving.
- 6. Garnish with parsley mint or coriander leaves.
- 7. Serve hot with pita bread or buns.






